The Fourth Annual Rutgers Pigeon Fanciers Conference will be held Sat., Dec. 4 at Blake Hall, College of Agriculture and Environmental Science, New Brunswick, N.J. Problems affecting pigeon breeding will be discussed. Subjects to be discussed are "Stimulants and Depressants" by Col. Frank Penas, "Drugs and Their Applications" by Dr. David C. Tudor, "Genetics" by Joseph W. Quinn, "Ordinances" by Attorney Robert P. Swartz, and "Loft Construction" by Col. Groft Grantum. It might be well to state that Mr. Swartz is the lawyer who handled the Paterson, N.J. ordinance problem.
